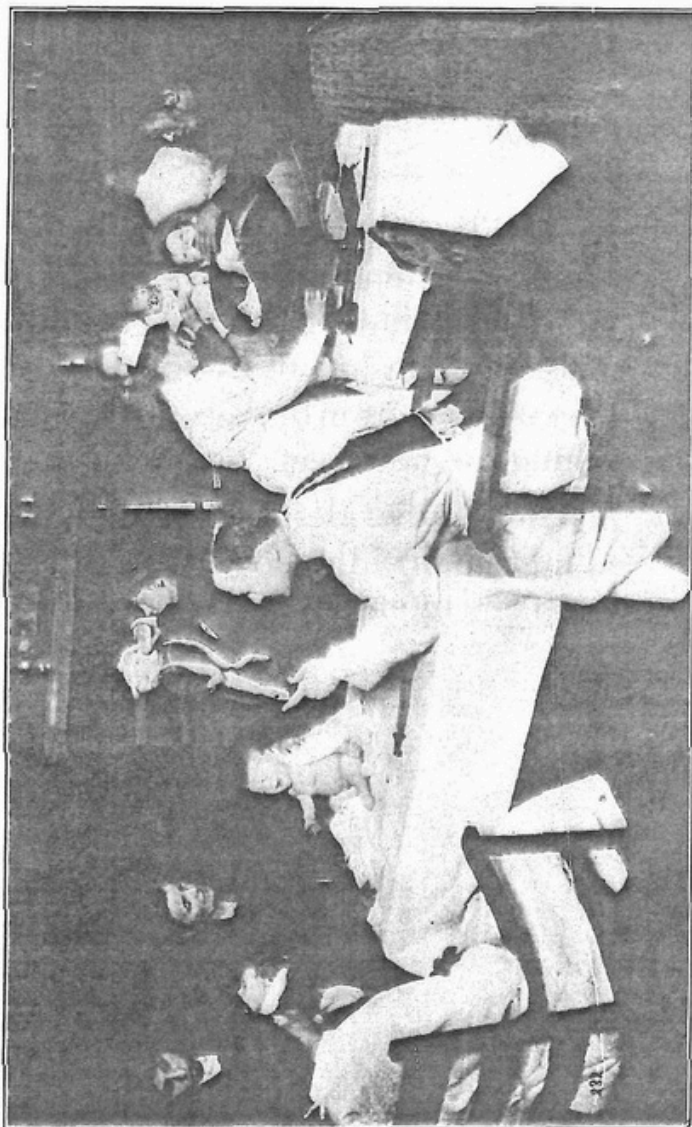

### Object

The object of the Society is to keep well babies well by teaching mothers how to feed and care for their infants.

Weekly conferences are held at the Infant Welfare Stations. To these meetings mothers bring their babies regularly, and the babies are undressed, weighed by the nurse and examined by the physician.

To the conferences are brought not only babies who are artificially fed but also breast-fed babies.

It is important to reach the breast-fed baby, for in most instances with proper instruction and supervision these babies thrive at the breast, when before with the addition of cows milk they did poorly.

Ten times as many bottle-fed babies die as breast-fed babies.

The physician after examining the baby at the conference prescribes a milk mixture for it, or instructs the mother as to nursing of her child.

The nurse follows the baby in the home and there emphasizes the advice given by the physician at the conference and teaches the mother how to carry out these instructions.

## Report of the Superintendent

The year ending December 31, 1913, finishes the third year of work of this Society since its reorganization. The volume of the work done by the nurses is increasing, at the same time we cannot meet the demands of the community.

The thirteen districts are located in the congested localities where the infant mortality is highest. There is a station in each district in charge of a physician and nurse. During July and August the staff was increased by five nurses, through the co-operation of the Health Department, and too much in commendation cannot be said of this co-operation.

The past year the Society has cared for 3,678 babies, 41,647 visits have been made by the nurses in the homes, and there has been an average attendance of sixteen babies at the conferences.

The causes responsible for infant mortality and morbidity in the largest number of cases are poverty, ignorance and the social conditions under which we live. The problems encountered by the nurses are often overwhelming and the social problem is often times much more difficult of solving than the medical one.

We have assisted in securing relief, taught many mothers how to better care for their infants and not only saved many babies who otherwise would not have had a fighting chance, but have aided those who have survived to be more physically equal to take their place in the community.

The nurse little knows when she starts out to make a call just what will be expected of her, whether it will be to teach how to feed and bathe the baby or to decide whether the boarder who has not paid his board bill should be evicted or allowed further consideration.

Appreciating the importance of social training for nurses doing public health work, members of our staff who have not previously had such training are attending the evening course at the School of Civics and Philanthropy.

Superstitions which prevail in the homes of many of our families indicate the dense ignorance that the nurse must cope with. One mother does not believe in washing the baby's ears because it will make the baby deaf, while another goes

to the stock yards to obtain the fresh stomach of a cow, being careful that the contents are not removed, so that it may be warm, into which she places the baby, leaves it there for twenty-four hours, and must not give a bath for several days after. This she has been told by the neighbor will cure marasmus.

It is gratifying to see that in most instances the mothers respond upon being taught what is best for their babies, as well as the confidence which is placed in the nurse.

One morning the nurse in one of our districts was asked by a child to come in and see their baby. The nurse asked what was the matter with the baby. The little girl replied: "Baby cries all the time." In going into the home several children followed. When the nurse asked the mother why she thought her baby cried all the time, a small boy standing by responded, "I know, feed the baby all the time." Whereupon the nurse asked, "How do you know so much about it?" "You tell my mother to feed baby every four hours, six, ten, two, six, ten, and baby no more cry." So it is not only the mothers who learn, but the boys and girls as well.

Many of the mothers are most appreciative of the help which the nurses give. One of our babies was very sick with pneumonia. The nurse went in every day to carry out the doctors orders and gave such care as the baby needed. When the baby recovered the mother made a wish for the nurse, which was, "God would keep her in good health for many years to help other mothers and save other babies." It is such gratitude that makes it possible to go day after day in the homes of the district and keep a light heart.

Our staff of thirteen nurses are a group of splendid women, whose untiring efforts and interest in the babies and mothers has made it possible to accomplish the results which we are able to present today. Much of the success of the field work is due to the ever faithful supervision of Miss Phelan, who has been with the organization from the beginning.

I cannot leave the question of our nursing staff without making honorable mention of the work of Miss Wanda Prysluska, the first nurse to come on our staff and who took charge

of the first station. Miss Prysluska, who was an untiring worker, had much to do with making a success of the work in its early beginning, left us to take charge of a Children's Hospital at Warsaw, Russia.

During the months of July and August more babies came to us than we could possibly have cared for, if we had not had the co-operation of the Health Department. I wish to publicly acknowledge the appreciation of the Society to Dr. Young for increasing our staff by sending five nurses, also the nurses who came to us for their co-operation as well as to the United Charities, the United Jewish Charities, Hospitals, the Visiting Nurse Association, the Children's Home and Aid Society, the Settlements, Day Nurseries, the Park Commissioners, County Agent, the Registration Bureau, the American Needle Work Guild and many other friends who have remembered us.

The Woman's Auxiliary, which was organized early in the year, has given us encouragement on every hand, by their active interest and assistance. The wonder is how did we ever get on without them.

During the year there has been an increase in the requests to present the work of the Society to clubs and other organizations. This has been done in most instances by illustrated talks. We now have about fifty slides showing the work at the station and in the home.

The number of stations and nurses have been increased by two. Seven nurses and five stations are supported by annual contributions, and two more have been supported for a period of six months and eight months respectively.

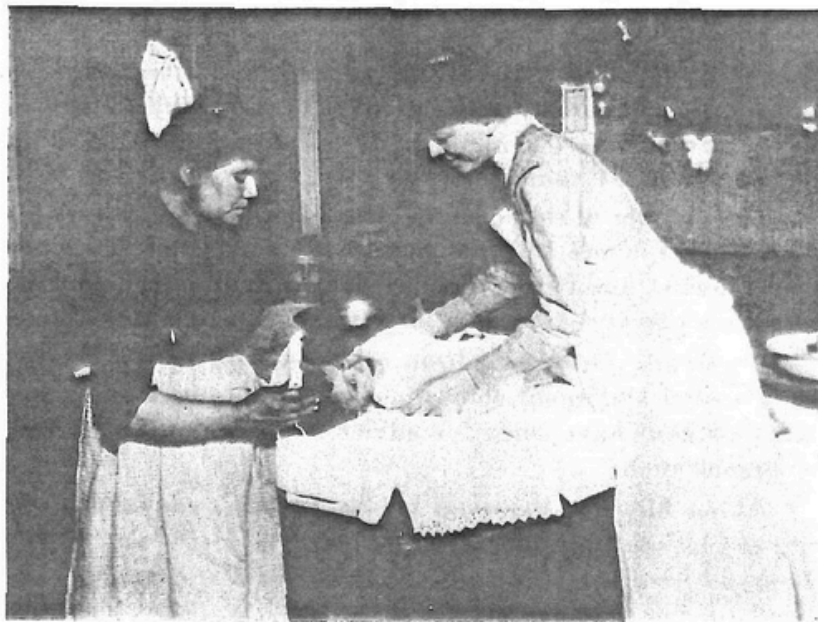
Physicians and nurses from other sections of the country have visited and spent some time observing our work, while many requests have come for advice as to methods and form of organization.

About fifty-five thousand babies are born annually in the city of Chicago and of this number, between fifteen and twenty thousand need the service of the Infant Welfare Society. To care for this number would mean fifty stations, sixty-five

nurses and fifty-five physicians. There also should be an additional number of nurses for prenatal work.

Teaching the mother how to care for herself and the infant, before its birth, is most important. The point of attack on infant mortality should be through instruction of the mother before the birth of her child rather than afterwards. Such a program would mean an annual budget of \$110,000. Until the city fathers can be made to see the importance of promoting public health, and appropriating sufficient funds, it will be necessary for a private organization such as ours, to appeal to the public for support. Private organization should occupy the position of an experimental agency. Dr. Young has already stated that the council has made an appropriation for four Infant Welfare Stations for four months of this year. This is encouraging.

Today when so much is being said regarding efficiency, we cannot consider a community efficient when it is willing to spend forty-five dollars to bury an infant while fifteen dollars would save it.

## Report of the Medical Director for 1913

*Given at the Annual Meeting  
January 29, 1914.*

To the Members of the Infant Welfare Society of Chicago.

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

As time goes on it becomes more and more evident, that it is far easier and cheaper to prevent disease than to cure it. Our slogan, "To Keep the Well Baby Well," is nothing more than the above mentioned principle applied to our work. We have maintained this principle from the beginning of our work in 1911, and feel that in the end all infant welfare work must concentrate in this one mode of attack, that all other means are relatively inefficient to cope with the great problem of high infant mortality. I do not mean to imply that Infant Welfare Stations alone will solve the question, but do want to emphasize that in our present state of knowledge and our present economic condition they are the best way of saving the babies of the congested sections of our city. It is with great pleasure therefore, that we view the proposed establishment of municipal Infant Welfare Stations. It is with great pleasure that we hear physicians outside of our organization working along similar lines, say that they feel convinced that more can be done for the babies of the congested districts by the establishment of Infant Welfare Stations than by any other means.

This is not to be wondered at, when one considers the results that have been and are being obtained in our stations. The splendid results that our doctors and nurses are able to achieve in each and every one of our stations speak for themselves. When an infant weighing  $1\frac{1}{2}$  pounds can thrive, gain seven pounds in six months in home surroundings that contain no incubator, no electric heater or pads, I for one am willing to admit that the possibilities of our work are great, indeed. With housing conditions improved and if we are to get at the root of the matter, they must be improved, with the nurse instructing in the home and with the baby periodi-

cally examined by the station physician, the number of infants that swell our mortality statistics will be greatly reduced.

During the year 1913 the Infant Welfare Society cared for 3,678 babies, of these 144 died, a mortality of 3.8%, as compared with 4.2% for 1911, and 4.3% for 1912. Of the 144 deaths about three-sixths were due to respiratory diseases and the acute infectious fevers, two-sixths due to gastro enteric disease and in one-sixth of the cases the exact cause of death was unknown. The size of third group is due to the fact that so many of our babies when sick are referred to dispensaries and hospitals. The large number of deaths from respiratory diseases during the winter months is a problem almost as great as the deaths from the summer heat, and is one that is very much more difficult to meet.

At this point I want to express my most sincere thanks and appreciation to the members of the Medical Staff, many of whom have been with the organization since the beginning, and practically without interruption have twice a week given their time to the work. The organization up to the present has not been able to pay these men any salary, but with improvement in the financial condition of our Society, I should like to recommend very strongly that the doctors be paid at least a nominal sum each month for the valuable service that they render.

During the past two summers, through a grant made by the Otho S. A. Sprague Institute, work has been done in connection with the Infant Welfare Station to determine, if possible, the relationship of heat to excessive summer mortality. The tabulation of the home temperatures indicate that infants can stand degrees of heat without apparent ill effects that are considerably above the figures usually given if properly taken care of. Any direct relation between heat and morbidity from gastro intestinal disturbances is not evident from the study. It is hoped that the work can be continued this summer.

The year 1913 we can look back upon as the year in which we began to realize what a task there was before us to reach all of the districts that are in need of infant care. In

order to better study the situation and get a concrete idea of how large a problem we are facing we prepared a spot map of Chicago showing all of the deaths in children under one year. Two things stand out most prominently in the study. (1) That the great bulk of infant deaths are limited to relatively small area. (2) That almost as many babies die in the winter as in the summer months. Furthermore, we have calculated that in order to cover the city properly with Infant Welfare Stations, it would necessitate about forty additional stations.

It is evident therefore, what a large problem the public has before it. It is obvious how this problem must be attacked. The field officers of the Society are anxious to extend the work and it only needs the necessary funds to set the machinery going that can save the city of Chicago many hundred lives each year.

## President's Annual Report for 1913

### Woman's Auxiliary

IN presenting this first annual report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Infant Welfare Society, we beg to call attention to the fact that we are still very young—barely eight months old—and that it required much time in the beginning to study the work in order to find the avenues through which we could be of most efficient service.

The Auxiliary was organized May 27, 1913. Its object is to co-operate in every way with the work of the Infant Welfare Society, and give all possible assistance to the Board of Directors. As the work is largely that of conference between doctor, nurse and mother concerning each individual baby—this being followed by instruction in the home—it appeals strongly to the mother instinct. The membership of the Auxiliary is made up of groups of women located in different parts of the city and the nearby suburbs. Each group is known as a Center, and has its own governing body, and the officers of these Centers constitute an Executive Committee, to which is given the management of the organization. The total enrollment is now between five and six hundred members, with a prospect of an increase to eight or nine hundred within the next few months.

In the early summer the Evanston group opened a new station in a congested Italian district. Their President reports that several cases of actual starvation confronted them at first. This station has proved a most valuable one and the women have now raised sufficient money for its entire support. At a recent meeting of their Center they presented lantern-slide views of the work done at their own conferences, so that each contributor might feel the personal touch and know just how the money collected was being expended.

A group of women at Hyde Park are concentrating their efforts in developing the Bishop Station in the Stock Yards district. Funds have been collected, sewing done, clothing provided, needy families visited and a musicale for the benefit of the station is to be given in February.

Another group on the South Side are devoting their energies to a station at Helen Day Nursery and expect to be able to support it within a short time. They are chiefly the younger married women and are very much in earnest.

Riverside, Hinsdale and Downers Grove are looking after the Burlington Station at West Park, No. 3. Each suburb has its own Center and funds are raised through personal solicitation. Added to this Riverside has given two benefits, an afternoon party, and a tea dance, and Hinsdale an afternoon party and an open air play.

A number of children known as the "Winnetka Aides" have raised \$125.00 and purchased twenty-five small ice boxes which were loaned through the heat of the summer to destitute families.

The Auxiliary has two Junior organizations of about forty members each, one in Kenwood and the other in Hinsdale. These young people have been working steadily raising funds, making little garments with their own hands, assisting the nurses at the stations on conference days and paying for an interpreter. A party was given at Christmas time for five hundred mothers and children. The interest of these young girls is a great help, and the good they themselves are getting from the work cannot be measured.

The foregoing is a summary of what has been accomplished this winter. One of the greatest needs our work has felt is Publicity. So very few people in the past have understood the meaning of the words "Infant Welfare," hence a comprehensive plan is now being developed from which great results are expected. The Advertising Men's Association of Chicago has offered to donate to the babies, a week of continuous advertising. April 19th to 25th is to be known as "Baby Week." Street car cards, bill boards, booklets, posters, hangers, press notices, electric signs, theatre programs and moving picture films are planned, which will bring this cause to the attention of the entire city. By means of this propaganda, we hope that sufficient money can be secured so that the needy children of our great city may have their chance to be normal, and to start life with a capital stock of strong healthy bodies.

To the women of the Auxiliary has been delegated the task of gathering in a large part of the funds to be collected during this campaign and at present a number of them are uniting their forces and adding a new phase of action to their efforts. They are securing prominent leaders from each ward in the city who will organize committees in every precinct to make a house to house canvass during "Baby Week" for donations. Literature will be left in every home. This is no small task, but already many wards have reported and we hope the middle of February will see the plans complete.

The President wishes to take this opportunity to thank the women of the Auxiliary for their unfailing support throughout the year. No meeting was called or work undertaken, however difficult, that did not receive prompt and enthusiastic response. In this day of a multiplicity of interests such loyalty is inspiring.

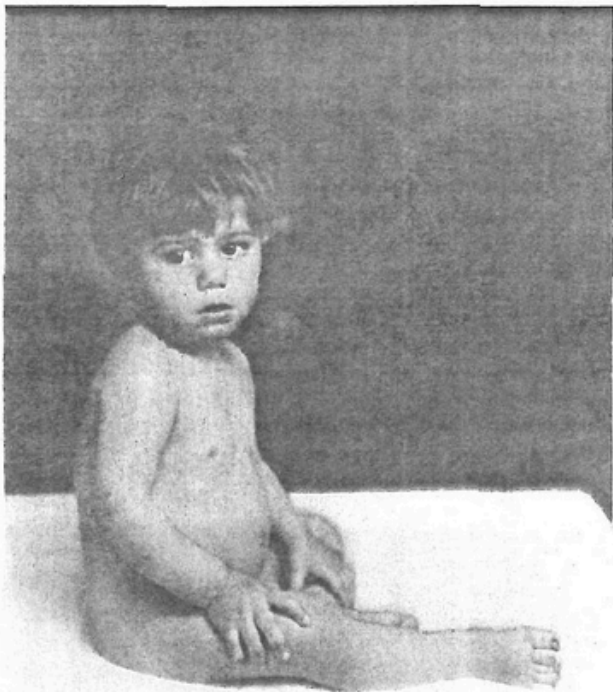

## How to Keep the Baby Well

Mothers, nurse your babies. The greatest good you can do your children is to nurse them during the first year.

Nurse your baby only four times during the day: at 6 a. m., 10 a. m., 2 p. m., 6 p. m., and once at night. If the infant cries between feeding give it some boiled water. A baby cries oftener from thirst than from hunger.

Dress your baby only in loose fitting clothes, so that it can move its arms and legs.

The baby should have only one feeding between 6 o'clock at night and 6 o'clock in the morning.

The baby ought to sleep alone.

The best and safest way to raise your baby is to nurse it.

Ten bottle-fed babies die to one that is breast-fed.

Before weaning the baby come to an Infant Welfare Station.

Do not pick up the baby each time that it cries. Teach it from the beginning to be content alone.

The baby must have a tub bath every day, and on very warm days, sponged with cool water once or twice daily.

Do not feed the baby anything that the doctor has not prescribed.

Keep your milk bottles in the ice box or in cold water.

Use a fresh bottle for each feeding. Do not pour the milk into another bottle. Warm bottles before feeding to baby.

All nipples and bottles should be cleaned and boiled once each day. Keep the nipples dry, in a clean covered glass.

Do not feed the baby oftener than every four hours. The stomach must have a chance to rest or the baby will get sick.

An over-fed baby is usually an irritable, crying baby. A normal baby sleeps from 18 to 20 hours a day. The more fresh air and sunshine the baby gets the better it will sleep.

Keep the windows open all day and all night, except during the heat of the mid-day sun.

Screen your windows and doors, as flies are carriers of disease. Many cases of summer diarrhoea are due to germs carried by flies. Keep decaying vegetables and fruits covered, garbage attracts flies.

Have the baby vaccinated when a few months old.

If the baby has diarrhoea stop all food, give only boiled water, and see your doctor immediately.

Do not wash out the baby's mouth.

## By-Laws

*of the*

## Infant Welfare Society of Chicago

### ARTICLE I.

The object of the organization is to keep babies well by advice, by supervision, by encouraging breast feeding, by instruction of the mothers in the rules of hygiene and by furnishing certified milk below cost.

### ARTICLE II.

Any person may become a member of the Infant Welfare Society of Chicago by contributing to the financial support of the Society, each contribution to be regarded as payment for membership for a period of one year from the date of its receipt. Provided: That no person may hold more than one membership at the same time.

### ARTICLE III.

There shall be a meeting of the members of the Society in January of each year for the purpose of electing eight (8) directors, receiving reports of the officers of the Society and the chairmen of the standing committees, and for the purpose of transacting such other business as may be proper under the provisions of the Charter. Notice of the Annual Meeting, or any adjournment thereof, shall be sent out by the Secretary at least ten (10) days in advance of the meeting. At such meeting ten (10) persons shall constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The management and control of the Infant Welfare Society shall be vested in a Board of twenty-four (24) directors, of whom there shall be three classes, each class being composed of eight (8) members, who shall be elected annually for terms of three (3) years each; of this Board the President, Vice President and Secretary shall be, and the Treasurer may be, members.

The directors shall hold regular meetings on the third Thursday of January, April, August and October, and special meetings may be called by the President, or, in case of absence, by the Vice President, or by any three (3) members of the Board of Directors. Five (5) members of said Board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. Any vacancy in the Board of Directors, occasioned either by removal by vote of a majority of its members or by any other cause, shall be filled by the Board temporarily or until the next following Annual Meeting of the Society, at which Annual Meeting the vacancy shall be filled by election in the regular manner for the remainder of the unexpired term.

#### ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The officers of the Infant Welfare Society shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the Board of Directors immediately after the Annual Meeting of the members, for a term of one year, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Any vacancy in any office shall be filled by the Board of Directors at its next regular meeting.

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to create from time to time such additional offices and committees as may be deemed advisable in the proper conduct of the work of the Society.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors, and to call special meetings of the Board when, in his opinion, such shall be necessary. The President shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to assume all the duties of the President in the latter's absence. The Vice President shall be chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The duties of the Secretary shall be to take the minutes of the proceedings of the meetings of the Society and of the Board of Directors and to keep them among the records of the Society, and to perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office.

Section 5. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to receive, keep and disburse the funds of the Society, to render an account of receipts and disbursements to the Board of Directors at each regular meeting of said Board, and to submit a full report at each Annual Meeting of the Society.

#### ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall appoint from its own number the following standing committees:

- 1.—Executive
- 2.—Co-operation
- 3.—Education
- 4.—Finance
- 5.—Legislation
- 6.—Publicity
- 7.—Stations

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have entire charge of the management of the Infant Welfare Society between meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Co-operation. This committee shall co-operate with other organizations doing welfare work in the city of Chicago, so that in every way this Society shall do most effectively the work which it is undertaking to do, and at the same time aid all other organizations in their proper endeavors.

Section 4. The Committee on Education shall, by means of free lectures, pamphlets, or such other practical measures as may be deemed advisable, extend the knowledge of infant welfare.

Section 5. The Finance Committee shall plan the methods for raising funds for the use of the Society, have oversight of the bookkeeping and accounting methods employed by the Society and make recommendations to the Board of Directors as to financial distributions.

Section 6. Legislation. This committee shall interest itself in originating legislation, or in co-operating with legislation proposed by others, which has especial reference to the welfare of mothers and infants.

The Committee on Legislation shall not introduce legislation nor represent the Society in any legislative matter without first having the approval of the Board of Directors or Executive Committee.

Section 7. Publicity. This committee shall be charged with the responsibility of using every proper means for bringing the work of this Society to the attention of the public.

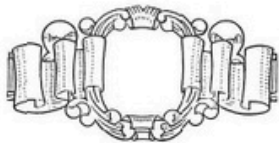
Section 8. Stations. The Stations Committee shall have oversight of the Stations conducted by the Society; shall make inspection of the conditions and work at the various stations; shall, in connection with the Superintendent, employ the nurses, and in connection with the Medical Director arrange for the services of physicians, and shall, with the approval of the Board of Directors or Executive Committee, establish new stations of the Society.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The By-Laws of the Infant Welfare Society may be altered or amended by vote of the members of the Society and at any Annual Meeting or adjournment thereof, or at any special meeting; provided, however, that when such amendment is to be proposed each member shall be given at least ten (10) days' written notice to this effect; such notice to contain a copy of the amendment proposed and the Article and Section of the By-Laws to be changed thereby.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

The construction of these By-Laws shall be determined by the Board of Directors in the event of any uncertainty or dispute.
